June is Men's Health Month

Please join with the providers at Las Clinicas del Norte and The Men's Health Network in celebrating Men's Health Month. Then Congressman and former Governor Bill Richardson introduced a bill into Congress calling attention to the importance of keeping our sons, fathers, nephews and husbands healthy.

The Men's Health Network is a nonprofit organization that promotes and encourages men to take responsibility for their own health. Their slogan is: *Building Healthy Families One Man At A Time*. Dr. David Gremilion of the Men's Health Network is quoted as saying: "There is a silent health crisis in America...it's a fact on average, American men live sicker and die younger than American women".

Health Facts:

Men die at a higher rate than women from the top 10 causes of death and are victims of over 92% of workplace deaths

Women are 100% more likely to visit the doctor for an annual examination and preventive services than men* Men suffer hearing loss at 2x the rate of women Testosterone is linked to elevations of LDL, the bad cholesterol, and declines in the HDL, the good cholesterol By the age of 100, women outnumber men eight to one** More males than females are born (105 vs. 100), but from age 35 on, women outnumber men

Of the over 9 million older persons living alone, 80% are women

Men are at greater risk of death in every age group, risk taking and suicide account for much of the disparity in the age group from 15-24 years of age. In 1920 the life expectancy gender gap was only 1 year. By 2010, men were dying approximately 5 years sooner than women. In 2010 the Life Expectancy at Birth for males and females was 78.7 years. For Hispanic women the Life Expectancy is 83.8 years as compared to Hispanic males 78.5 years.

Why Men are at High Risk:

A higher percentage of men have no healthcare coverage Men make ½ as many physician visits for prevention Men are employed in the most dangerous occupations, such as mining, fire fighting, construction and fishing Society continues to discourage healthy behaviors in men and boys

Research on male-specific diseases is under funded The chance of being a homicide victim places African-American men at an unusually high risk

Men have fewer infection-fighting T-cells and are thought to have weaker immune systems than women

Heart Disease: In 2010* almost twice as many men as women die of ischemic heart disease

Cancer: 2010*, significantly more men than women dies of most cancers.

Depression in men is undiagnosed, contributing to the fact that men are 4x as likely to commit suicide.

Men have a higher death rate for most of the leading causes of death:
